

WHAT IS IT?



- New World screwworm (NWS) is a parasitic fly whose larvae (maggots) feed on living tissue
- Larvae "screw" into wounds or natural body openings of warmblooded animals, including livestock, horses, pets, wildlife, and people
- Untreated cases can lead to severe wounds, infections, and death
- NWS was eradicated from the US over 50 years ago, but recently has been found in Mexico

WHAT CAN WE DO?

- Vigilant screening after travel and rapid reporting are essential to keep Illinois free of NWS
- Check all animals for:
 - Wounds with larvae: wounds can be any size and as small as a pinhole
 - Foul smell of decay
 - Animal Behavior: headshaking, scratching, depressed, not eating
 - Wounds leaking fluid

- Provide brief history (including travel), photos, owner information, animal ID, location
- If there are fallen larvae: collect in a sealable container and cover with 70% alcohol or ethanol and keep in a dark place until further instruction
